While the College's building has remained largely empty, its staff and students have been busy engaging in remote learning. Teachers have adapted to setting work online and our students have responded well to this challenge. Our Linton Learner attributes of independence and responsibility are coming to the fore at the moment.

As I write this, we are in the throes of making plans to consider how we might be able to safely accommodate small groups of our Year 10 students in school. This is in response to the government's announcement regarding the intention for schools to begin to re-open in a phased way to specified year groups from 1st June. We are also making transition plans to consider how best to support Year 6s with their move up to LVC.

This means that the vast majority of our students will continue to be educated virtually until at least the start of the new academic year. # THE THINGS I REMEMBER......

A sprightly lady who was born in Burrough Green just after the turn of the century recalls some of the happenings in the village for our readers.

'I was born in 1901 at Pembroke Farm and can trace my family back as far as 1752. One of my earliest memories is that of going too school at three year's old. I can remember walking over the green to school. There were no cars, nothing on the roads and I can relive now how we all had cocoa at 11am! Mr Burgess was the headmaster and the foundation of education was the three Rs, and we had to learn them properly. My father, John Starling, left school at nine and could read and write perfectly. He used to read Dickens to us, and we had to learn to read at home as well as at school.

The Rector was Reverend E J Church, and the mainstay of the village when I was a child. The Church and the School ruled the village without question. The children had to go to church three times on a Sunday, with Sunday School in in the morning and afternoon, and in the summer we went to the Rectory in the

afternoons and listened to stories read by Mrs Church. She was one of the most outstanding persons I can remember, she had a beautiful voice, I can hear her now. After the stories which were always suitable for children, she would take us round the rectory garden and give us fruit and flowers to take home. She was the mother of a large family. I can remember John, Violet, Mary, Daisy, Howard, Willy and Christine, but I know there were more.

The Laceys of The Hall owned most of Burrough Green and they had a large family too, and when the Rector's family and the Lacey family were in church together, the church was practically full.

The chief farms in the village were Wyck Farm, White Hart Farm, Pembroke Farm and Green Farm, where I moved to from Pembroke Farm. This was a 'horsey' farm and run by my father for the Laceys. One bought milk at Wyck Farm, not often the full cream sort because that was kept for butter making.

At Green Farm the horses had to be fed at 5am to be ready for the men who came to work at 7am and then they were fed late in the evening after a day in the fields. Most of the men of the village worked on the farms and those not working on the village farms had to walk before dawn to places like Kirtling, and some went to Ravenshall, known as 'Ransell' to us. The men had to work very hard and were poorly paid, everything was done by hand but there was no option because you could not get out of the village.

One of my father's younger brothers was the first postman and he would take the post to outlying houses by pony. It was he who had one of the first appendix operations at Addenbrookes hospital too.

My father met my mother when he walked to Cambridge with a goose for Dr Porter of Peterhouse Lodge. She was housekeeper there and after that he often walked to Cambridge to do his courting. On their marriage in June 1899, Dr Porter presented the couple with a Bible which I still have

# E CAMBS DISTRICT COUNCILLORS' REPORTS

# JOHN TRAPP & CHARLOTTE CANE BOTTISHAM WARD

Due to the restrictions to control Coronavirus, the District Council cancelled all its meetings up to the end of May. Following the change in the law, allowing online meetings, we pressed the Council to resume its meetings. After several Parish Councils had held successful meetings using Zoom and Skype, the District Council finally held two Planning Committee meetings. The Annual Council Meeting will have been held by Zoom and will be available on YouTube at www.eastcambs.gov.uk/meetings/council-21052020.

The Council staff are mostly working from home.. People should still phone the switchboard number - 01353 665555, or the Direct Dial number if they have it, and they will be put through to the member of staff. Waste bin collections have continued as normal and fly tipping will be collected if reported, although staff will not check through to see if there is anything to identify who left the rubbish.

Only 74% of the businesses thought to be eligible for grants to support them through this pandemic have applied. If you know of anyone who might be eligible, please encourage them to apply via the District Council. They should email their name, business name, business address and phone number to covid19businessgrants@eastcambs.gov.uk or telephone the Council on 01353 665555.

Unfortunately, our call-in requesting a 6 month delay to the decision to cease funding the CAB in Ely was rejected. As a result of losing the funding from East Cambs the CAB in Ely has now closed. East Cambs DC have expanded their services to cover the housing advice which CARC used to deliver.

We are holding our surgeries and 'Meet your Councillors' by Zoom. The next one is Tuesday 23 June - please contact john.trapp@eastcambs.gov.uk for the link if you want to join.

Who could have predicted, just a few short weeks ago, what was to come for life in Britain and across the world? It is like nothing else most of us have ever experienced. Life has changed suddenly, dramatically and drastically for us all and these are worrying times for everyone, but we are adjusting and we will get through the COVID 19 pandemic, by pulling together and looking after each other. All services at the District Council are operational with some changes. The Recycling and Waste service has been operating

normally throughout, and whilst not wishing to single people out, the recycling team has continued to provide a service to the highest level.

The District Council has moved to home working for anyone that can and is taking measures to reduce risks for those still working from offices, etc.

By the time that you read this, the first virtual Full Council will have been held on 21<sup>st</sup> May. I will bring you details of this next month.

# Community Support

The support to communities is a co-ordinated effort between the County Council, the District Council and Parish and community support groups.

The countywide COVID 19 Coordination Hub is established to:

- Help ensure that services provided by key workers are sustained at safe and appropriate levels through the redeployment of staff and the deployment of volunteers
- Co-ordinate the distribution of support to the Shielded group
- Ensure with our partners that we are making the best use possible of all available resources to minimise anxiety, to co-ordinate social action, and to ensure those most vulnerable are benefitting from appropriate community support
- Work closely with District/City Hubs to ensure all vulnerable people are supported (who in turn work with the Parish and Community volunteer groups)
- To contact all known carers in the county to offer advice, information and support and to give them a telephone number if they need help

In the early tranches of data from Government there were around 15,000 people on the registered shielded list across Cambridgeshire and Peterborough. Around one third of this group report they have no support in All shielded people are receiving regular telephone contact from the case officers to ensure their needs are being met. Those without any support arrangements in place receive at least one call per week, with others receiving contact either every two or every three weeks. CCC is also contacting everyone by email or letter, to remind them that they are there should their support arrangements break down. There around 5,400 shielded people across are Cambridgeshire and Peterborough who are receiving a national food delivery each week, which is also supplemented by local deliveries of specialist items. Attention is now turning to providing value added support, such as books, games, education access, library access, etc to try to combat social isolation during the long period of lockdown. We hope that you and your families are all keeping safe at this difficult time. We know about all the good work going on in the villages to support the vulnerable and elderly. Well done everyone, keep up the good work.

## South Cambridgeshire District Council

# Cambridgeshire County Council

This is a hub for links to volunteer support as well as help/advice for businesses.

The County Council is also coordinating the assistance for those individuals who class as 'shielded' so required more support as they have health conditions which restrict their outside movements more seriously. If you think you know somebody who falls into this category, do let Henry know and he can make sure the County are aware of them.

# Remote Working and Voting

Both the County and District Councils have begun to hold committee meetings again, so large decisions at both authorities will be made again.

# Planning

The planning department at South Cambs continues to function with most applications being processed by officers in the usual way. More than 90% of planning applications are decided under delegation.

Parish Councils should continue to provide their comments in the usual way.

It has not been possible to hold Planning Committee meetings or to process applications that parish councils or local members have requested to go to committee.

There is a significant backlog of these application. We are soon to re-start the Planning Committee; the first remote meeting will be on Wednesday 13 May. The sole purpose of this meeting will be to agree the procedural protocols that will allow us to hold meetings remotely. The first proper meeting will be one or two weeks later when we will start processing planning applications again.

Parish council and member requests for applications to go to committee cannot be processed until a change to the constitution take place to make the delegation process 'legal'. This should happen at the next Council meeting on 21 May. The plan is then to start working through the backlog from Friday 22 May.

Remote working committees is a new process for us all, no doubt there will be difficulties. So please bear with us as we do our best to get things right.

# Community Capital Fund

There is a new funding opportunity available at the County Council called the Community Capital Fund. There is significant funding available for community groups and parish councils to bid for as the total pot has £5,000,000.

# Green Bins

The green bin collections are due to start again as of Monday 4<sup>th</sup> May. To start with, it will be a reduced service however. People will be guaranteed one collection per month with the possibility of a second if there is capacity in the service. The message is <u>put out your green bin on the usual green bin day</u>. They will definitely be collected once and if they are collected twice in the month, this is a bonus.

The reason for the original suspension of the collections service was the reduced number of bin men and women due to the virus. Also, SCDC operate with fewer people in the cab, where it's usually 3 in the truck, we now operate with 2 to maintain social distancing.

# **Household Recycling Centres**

The County Council, who run the household recycling centres in Cambridgeshire, have a plan in place to reopen the centres on Monday 11<sup>th</sup> May. There will, of course, be restrictions in place to keep social distancing. # PARISH COUNCIL MEETINGS CANCELLED UNTIL FURTHER NOTICE:

Following on from the Government's announcement on Monday 16<sup>th</sup> March, together with the guidance from Public Health England and West Suffolk Council and NALC, in relation to COVID-19, the Council has made the decision to postpone all meetings until further notice. The Annual Parish Meeting and the Annual Parish Council meeting in May will no longer proceed, following new legislation under the Corona Virus Act 2020. Information on how to access the Council's remote online meetings will follow soon.

### End Year Accounts 2019/20

Following NALC's engagement with government around local council audit timeframes final regulations came into force on 30<sup>th</sup> April. These extend the statutory audit deadlines for 2019/20, to 30<sup>th</sup> November 2020. There are also plans for a Nature Walk with Information Boards and some improvements to the pond, such as a pond dipping platform and some works to tidy up the trees and bushes.
