DISTRICT COUNCILLORS' REPORT - East Cambs

Charlotte Cane & John Trapp

At an Extraordinary Council Meeting at the end of July, the Council considered an outline business case for building a crematorium, woodland burial centre and pet crematorium at Mepal to replace the Mepal Outdoor Centre. It was agreed to pursue this project even though the location is fifteen minutes away from an existing crematorium, and it would mean the loss of the Mepal Outdoor Centre. This proposal was opposed by John; Charlotte cannot take part as she has to declare a pecuniary interest, relating to her employer. A Mepal resident has started a petition to keep the Mepal Outdoor Centre -

https://www.change.org/p/ecdc-mepal-outdoor-

<u>centre-to-remain-a-leisure-centre</u>. John is aware that many young people in Bottisham ward have enjoyed the activities at Mepal Outdoor Centre and feels the District has a need for an outdoor adventure activity centre. The next proposal will come to the Finance and Assets Committee for detailed consideration.

## EAST CAMBRIDGESHIRE DISTRICT COUNCIL Woodditton Ward

Hopefully, residents have enjoyed the summer, although we appear to have had extremes of the weather in the last few weeks, with loads of sun, wind and rain!

This could be the consequences of climate change and after East Cambridgeshire District Council passed a Climate Change Emergency in October 2019, the Council's committees have been working on a detailed costed plan to implement policies that will reduce the carbon footprint in the District. The Finance & Assets Committee at their meeting on  $23^{rd}$  July, approved a budget of £100,000 to implement those plans.

The District Council continue to hold Council meetings, including Committee meetings virtually. This will continue for the foreseeable future, whilst the current restrictions are in place. Residents can listen and see these meetings live, as required by the legislation. The log-in details for each meeting are on the East Cambridgeshire website. If you are having any difficulties in finding the log-in details, please contact us.

#### Bus, Walk, Cycle Consultation - Survey

The results of the consultation continue to be processed and will be discussed by the relevant committee shortly.

#### Sky Lanterns & Balloons

After the motion presented to Full Council on 16<sup>th</sup> July 2020, asking that the release of sky lanterns and balloons be banned on all property and land owned by East Cambs District Council, discussion is ongoing with officers, to agree the detail of letters to be sent to all Parish Councils within East Cambridgeshire. to pass a similar motion to ban the release of sky lanterns and balloons from Parish Council land.

In addition, a plan on how to communicate this to businesses, landowners, communities, schools and individuals in East Cambridgeshire is ongoing.

## Mepal Outdoor Centre – planned redevelopment

Some residents may have seen reports in the press about a proposed development of a crematorium with associated woodland burial and pet cemetery facilities at the former Mepal Outdoor Centre.

Mepal Outdoor Centre was previously managed by Cambridgeshire ACRE on behalf of the Mepal Outdoor Centre Charitable Trust. The Trust had experienced financial difficulties with operating the site and following the break in and arson attack in December 2016 they surrendered the lease back to the Council.

ECDC has explored a range of options and invited expressions of interest for the site, twice, through a tender process. This exercise was overseen by a cross-party Working Party of both Conservative and Liberal Democrat Councillors. Despite extensive work, a suitable proposal has not been forthcoming.

Aside from the unsuccessful attempts to find a suitable leisure operator for Mepal, the District Council has had an ambition to deliver and run a crematorium and woodland burial area within the district and this was included in the Council's 2017 to 2019 Corporate Plan.

When investigations into the crematorium industry began, Members received external expert advice that crematorium companies are known for rapidly and successfully submitting rival proposals when they hear of a new crematorium being proposed in an area, and that this presented a very real threat of failure to bring the ambition to reality. ECDC took steps to reduce the risk of this happening by removing the item from the Corporate Plan and developing its plans confidentially to get them to a relatively advanced stage prior to the information becoming public.

The Mepal site was identified as having potential to site the new crematorium and woodland burial area and exploratory investigations and site surveys were undertaken. At a Special Full Council meeting on 31<sup>st</sup> July 2020, Council approved an Outline Business Case to build and operate an ecological crematorium, woodland burial area and pet cemetery on the Mepal site.

The proposals are at an early stage in the process. ECDC has approved an Outline Business Case and there are several stages still to be undertaken before a Final Business Case can be presented to Council for a final decision. We will keep you updated.

Whilst the height of the Covid-19 pandemic has reduced, everyone needs to stay vigilant, follow the relevant guidance and prevent the spread of the virus. If anyone has any concerns or requires information, please contact the ECDC main number on 01353 665555.

#### MARSH MAIL News from Linton Village College

It has been an exceptional year for us all, but in particular our Year 11 students who have foregone their traditional school leavers' experiences and rites of passage. While examinations are typically stressful, they are an important demarcation of the end of secondary education and capture students' academic accomplishments.

This year, the awarding of GCSEs was replaced by a Centre Assessed Grade process. This involved teachers estimating the grades that students would have achieved had they sat the exams, using their best professional judgements. Subject rankings of predicted grades were then scrutinised and moderated by subject teams and senior leaders. The government decided that the Centre Assessed Grades would stand without moderation, aside from some students' grades increasing as a result of a centrally applied algorithm.

Now, more than ever, it is important to recognise and celebrate students' broad educational and personal achievements. I am proud of LVC students' stoicism and resilience as their time at LVC ended prematurely. There are many examples of students who have shown exceptional determination, compassion and drive during these challenging times. All have been a delight to watch grow into exceptional young people during their time at the College. We wish them every success in the next step of their education, careers and lives. As we enter September our focus is on fully reopening the College safely to all students and staff. Extensive planning and preparation has been underway during the summer holiday to ensure that the site and systems are ready for all of our students to return to school full time.

Many changes have had to be implemented to make this possible and to adhere to government guidance. This includes zoning the school site for different year groups, creating nomadic specialist teaching and staggering break and lunch times to reduce movement and minimise close contact between students in different year groups. This is in addition to enhanced cleaning and hygiene measures.

We are all looking forward to seeing our young people back at school and benefiting from face to face teaching again. The school community's ability to adapt and care for each other has been evident during this crisis.

Honk! Honk!

I read this week about the annual migration of geese, isn't their teamwork astonishing! As they fly in their "V" formation, the flapping of each bird's wings creates an uplift for the bird immediately following. By flying like this the whole flock has apparently at least a 70 percent greater flying range than if each bird flew on its own. This is most noticeable when a goose falls out of formation, it immediately feels the drag and resistance of trying to go it alone so guickly gets back into place to take advantage of the lifting power granted to it by the bird in front. When the head goose gets tired, it rotates back into the wing and another goose flies forward to take up the lead. The noisy honking you hear is of the geese behind encouraging those up front to keep going and maintain the speed!

What really touched me though was reading that when a goose gets sick or injured and falls out of the formation, two other geese fall out with it and follow it down to the ground, to lend help and protection. They stay with the fallen goose until it is able to fly again or until it dies; and only then do they launch out on their own or with another formation to catch up with their own group.

What a beautiful thing this is, a real encouragement from nature to live well in community together; lending

our strength, sharing the load, taking our rest and championing the more vulnerable.

In the words of Aleksandr the Meerkat 'Simples!'.

'So let's do it. Let's see how inventive we can be in encouraging love, helping out, and in spurring each other on.'. Hebrews 10: 24 The Message.
