WHAT'S ON AT THE RED LION BRINKLEY

Christmas Eve we will do our usual Taco Night and food will be available from 5:00 p.m. Christmas Day we will not be open for drinks. Boxing Day we will be closed.

While we usually do not open on a Tuesday, for Tuesday 27th we will open at lunch time and dinner time if there is any demand for it - so call us and let us know if you would like to come in. If we have no bookings even just for some drinks, then we will just stay closed.

Wednesday through Friday will be as normal.

Hogmanay we will be open for lunch, and for dinner and drinks in the evening, and when we are empty in the evening, we will close.

This winter will be horrible for all of us. We know of hundreds of UK pubs that are closing for good from January 1, and many hundreds more that are going to close until March/April. Depending on the supplier, business electricity prices have increased 250-500% this year. We heard from a pub today that their monthly electricity bill has increased from £650 to over £4,000. We will find out next week where we are, but none of this is sustainable for our industry.

What we do in terms of opening hours until Spring will likely depend on how the next several weeks go for us. Please either check our website, Facebook page, or call us as we all roll into winter here, since we will make whatever changes we think we have to do on a daily basis to cut our costs.

We already have Heineken increasing all their product lines again, this time 15-18%, from December 1, on the back end of their two 14% increases in 2022. Other breweries will surely follow. We will not accept having to charge £6 for a pint or £3.00 for a soft drink, and neither will you, so we have been trying to do something about that.

We did everything we could to help out during the pandemic years and are thinking hard again about what we can do for some people this winter that have supported us this past seven years. It is much harder now.

We will try as best we can to not increase prices. If you can though - please, try and do something for us this time around. Most of our food prices have not been increased for three or even four years. We are also looking at how we can provide some good wholesome food on a Wednesday and Thursday, at the lowest price possible. Our target is £10 for some food and a drink.

Please have the best Christmas time, given what we all are going through. Come and join us on Tuesday 27th

in the evening and we will buy you a drink for supporting us during this past seven years - or even just this past one! We'll know who you are. Just remember to let us know you are coming in! Gwyn & Morris.

DISTRICT COUNCILLORS' REPORT

Charlotte Cane & John Trapp - East Cambs Bottisham Ward

Transport

Thanks to a lot of local people and the AtoB1102 group the number 11 and 12 buses have been 'saved' at least until the end of March. However, we still need to persuade Stephensons and the Combined Authority to reinstate Bottisham on the number 11 route. We also need to address ticket charging and some other matters. But at least we have the buses. We are aware that the buses have not always run and have sometimes not kept to timetable - indeed the timetables are not yet displayed at all stops. That must be incredibly frustrating for people who need to get to work etc. but we must give Stephensons time to get used to running the new routes which they were only asked to tender for a few weeks ago. Public transport should be reliable and affordable so that all of us can get to work, visit friends, attend appointments, and enjoy our leisure time.

Unfortunately, there is a confusing structure of responsibility - the Combined Authority is meant to be responsible, but the Greater Cambridgeshire Partnership and the County Council also have a major say and none of them has adequate funds for the investment needed, nor are their combined funds sufficient. Earlier this year the Government rejected a bus improvement funding bid from the Combined Authority. Two causes of this rejection have been identified. The first was that the Department for Transport had applied a deprivation score, which did not help our cause as a high growth area. We agree that deprivation has to be tackled, but so does the increasing pressure on our transport system caused by our high growth. The second was the Government's view that the application had shown insufficient commitment to bus priority schemes, active travel and road charging. Bus priority schemes and cycle paths are expensive to deliver on rural roads. In other words, to achieve what everyone wants we need significant investment from central Government.

The Greater Cambridge Partnership's consultation is open and closes at midday on 23 December - GCP Making Connections 2022 | Consult Cambridgeshire (engagementhq.com). It is offering significantly improved services for most of us, paid for through a road charge for driving in Cambridge. It will have a major impact on these villages, especially on those who commute in Cambridge for work or study. We have some hard copies of the document which we have asked local shops etc to display for those without web access. Please contact us if you would like a copy.

Cost of Living Help

The East Cambs Housing and Community Advice Team will be visiting our area regularly to advise on Housing, Welfare Benefits, Energy, Debt and Money. Bottisham was recently added to the regular schedule at our

request and we are still pressing for the Advice Bus to visit other villages. In the meantime, please either go to Burwell or Bottisham or call the team on 01353 665555.

#### **Bus Services**

(See the information in Charlotte Cane's report.)

The Mayor of Cambridge and Peterborough (CPCA) is presenting a paper to the CPCA board at the end of November, which having seen the draft paper is very Cambridge centric and supports congestion charging in Cambridge.

### Congestion Charging

The Greater Cambridge Partnership (GCP) consultation on implementing a £5 congestion charge between 7am and 7pm on weekdays across the Greater Cambridge area, which would include Addenbrookes is now live, so please go to the GCP website and make your contribution, which runs to 5pm on  $23^{\rm rd}$  December.

I have serious concerns that the questions on the consultation are very leading and are not a proper consultation but aimed at getting their preferred outcome.

Any final decision will need to be agreed by a Full Cambridgeshire County Council, which knowing the opposition to this, is by no means guaranteed.

The GCP is an unelected body that allows no democratic challenge on behalf of East Cambs residents, and I will continue to challenge and lobby for my residents to get the best possible transport service in our area.

### County Council Budget

The County Council currently has a £28m budget gap for the 2023/2024 year. The Liberal Democrat led administration made an increase of 1.99% in their precept for the current year and put that straight

into reserves, so they already have some monies to balance the books. In addition, The Liberal Democrat led administration has made spending decisions on certain policies, knowing that this would put a strain on the budget.

I will continue to work to try to protect all County Council services from any cuts that the Liberal Democrats make.

### East Cambridgeshire District Council Budget

The District Council has kept their part of the Council Tax bill at the same amount for the last 9 years. We are looking at freezing our portion of the council tax for the 10<sup>th</sup> year running. We are the only District or County Council throughout the country that have been able to do that.

In the current climate, it is important that residents are able to keep as much of their own money as possible.

#### Traffic

We are continuing to see increased traffic through the villages south of Newmarket and there is certainly a noticeable increase in speeding through the villages.

#### Warm Hub

East Cambridgeshire District Council have set up, in conjunction with other partners, several warm hubs throughout the district.

### ADVENT COURSE -

### AN INVITATION FROM REV'D ROSEMARY:

The word Advent comes from the word Adventus which means Preparation.

For this reason I would like to hold an Advent course this year. This will be open to all, and it is proposed to hold it at the Ellesmere Centre Café in the Gredley

Room on Tuesday mornings during the four Tuesdays in Advent - 29th November 6th, 13th and 20th December.

Coffee is normally offered after a short time of study and paid for by those attending. Please let me know if you would like to join us - if you are not able to attend all four, feel free to come on the days that you can. This course is based on the Advent Crown.

During the church services we light candles remembering those who have played a significant part in the story of the arrival of Jesus, not only as the tiny baby we think of arriving at Christmas, but also as the young man beginning his ministry spreading the words of God's great love for us.

The first week, called Advent Sunday, is on the 27th November. The first candle is lit so we can remember the Patriarchs of the Jewish faith starting with Abraham, Joseph, Moses and David. These were the great men who listened to God and started the Jewish Faith. Let us remember Jesus was a descendant of David and was of the Jewish Faith. He came to renew the Jewish faith not to change it; But because the leaders of the faith couldn't accept Jesus' authority, a break away faith or the followers of Jesus began. Originally called 'Followers of the Way,' later to be called Christians.

The second week the second candle is lit, remembering the great prophets such as Elijah, Isaiah and Ezekiel to name but a few. These prophets gave us insight to the future of the faith and the promised arrival of Jesus.

The third candle is lit on the third week to remember John the Baptist; as we think how we remember the importance of getting ready for the arrival of Jesus, by asking for forgiveness for our sins.

The fourth candle reminds us of Jesus' Mother called the Blessed Virgin Mary. She has quite a story to tell as we remember her bravery in following God and doing

The fifth candle is lit at Midnight Mass the night before Christmas Day as we celebrate the birth of Jesus.

These candles are lit to drive away the darkness of the winter nights as the Christian Faith drives away our fear and helps us to see that Jesus Christ is always with us; so the darkness of the winter nights are not to be feared, for Jesus brings Light and Hope into our lives with the great love God has for us. Amen
