



#### WOODLAND VOLUNTEERS NEEDED

Last Saturday of the month from September to February each year

Lower Wood, Weston Colville is within easy reach on foot or bike for most of us. Apparently Cambridgeshire has fewer trees than any other UK county so we're lucky to have woodland in which we can freely roam.

This fragment of an old wood, glorious with bluebells in spring, is owned and managed by the Wildlife Trust. Volunteer working parties meet on the last Saturday of each month during the winter, clearing, coppicing and layering.

Volunteer helpers are needed and are more than welcome. No prior knowledge or tools required - just willing hands, and the work is fun and invigorating. Duncan Mackay is the volunteer warden and will be there from 10.00 a.m. until about 2.00 p.m, and children and dogs can join in too.

So if you are keen to support local environmental work, just come to the main ride through Lower Wood from 10.00am on the last Saturday of the month. February is the last session of this season, so come along on 26<sup>th</sup> February if you can. The wood is situated between the parishes of Carlton and Weston Colville with easy

access from the top of Mill Road, Weston Colville, or by footpath from Willingham Green and Carlton.



# OPPORTUNITY TO LEARN A SPECIAL SKILL

An opportunity to learn about flint knapping, lime mortar and wall restoration for adults and children.



This project is in the very early stages following the

collapse of a section of the church wall at Burrough Green.

We are consulting with SPAB, the Society for the Protection of Ancient Buildings and planning a community project which will take place over a period of time.

Funding would be sought from the National Lottery Grants for Heritage and to qualify it is necessary to demonstrate community involvement and support.

It is hoped that volunteers can take part in all the

skills required for such work, including surveying the wall, flint knapping and the use of lime mortar. Schools, colleges and universities will be approached to invite students of all ages to be involved.



Students will have the opportunity to work on a real project to develop the range of skills needed for a successful career in construction; an industry where an understanding of historic buildings and techniques is often lacking.

Please would you contact me if you are interested or have any thoughts and ideas that might assist with this project.

If successful, there may be professionals involved from all around the country, so anyone happy to offer accommodation or help with catering would be wonderful, even if you are not interested in learning about flint wall repairs. There is something for everyone to do!!

# MARSH MAIL - News from Linton Village College

LVC students have been enjoying enriching learning opportunities in recent weeks. Years 7 and 8 have benefited from the new carousel structure in Technology lessons this academic year which has reduced class sizes and enabled students to engage with term-long projects in food and nutrition and design technology.

After last year's limited access to practical lessons, Key Stage Three students have been producing some amazing culinary creations including ratatouille, scones and quesadillas.

With a focus on food culture, Year 8 will be producing spanakopita (feta and spinach pie), Caribbean curry and stir fry this term.

Year 9 students have focused on food science, developing their knowledge of key processes such as aeration, emulsification and coagulation. They have applied their learning to their own practical skills including making honeycomb, pastries and gateaux.

GCSE classes have been mastering advanced core skills and food presentation, achieving some delicious and highly ornate dishes such as mille-feuille and salmon en croute.

Offering an enriching learning experience is a key priority at Linton Village College. As a communityfocused school, we are really keen to develop further connections with local independent catering and hospitality providers. # DISTRICT COUNCILLORS' REPORT

East Cambs. Bottisham Ward : Charlotte Cane & John Trapp

Congratulations to the Bottisham Cresset on its 500<sup>th</sup> edition. And congratulations to all the magazine teams for keeping your magazines going year in year out with interesting articles and keeping everyone informed and delivering them to every local household. We hope that Green Waste Collections have now restarted with two new HGV drivers joining the team. We have been guestioned about our statement in last month's article that 'Councillor Julia Huffer, as Chair of the Committee, decided that it was acceptable for the green waste to be cancelled for this period.' We said this because Schedule 4, Section 3 of the agreement between ECDC and ECSS provides: 'The scope of services to be delivered is set out in the Service Specifications for waste and street cleansing and these can only be amended with the endorsement of the Chair of Regulatory Services (or equivalent) for general operational matters and the Regulatory Services Committee for matters of policy relating to the delivery of services.'

In line with this, Councillor Huffer was briefed and endorsed the cancellation of green waste collections for the period. She could have held ECSS to delivering the service, she could have asked them to bring forward alternative proposals, she could have held a special meeting of Operational Services Committee to discuss the options, but she endorsed the amendment to suspend the Green Waste collection. In answer to our questions, Cllr Huffer explained that she accepted this reduction in service to protect the health of the workforce; that to demand a reduction in costs would be petty in the extreme, because other local Councils had also suspended the service; and that she decided green waste was the best collection to cancel because it was non statutory. We support actions to protect the health of the workforce but remain concerned that this decision was taken with such limited member input. The suspension of the service is an inconvenience to residents and potentially sets back our efforts to reduce waste going to landfill - the officers considered it was likely that the level of food in black bags would increase following the suspension. The East Cambs Community Fund grant application window will be open between Monday 17 January and Monday 21 February. Grants are intended to support the development of new or existing community services and initiatives that improve the quality of life for residents of East Cambridgeshire. The government's unwillingness to permit all Councils to meet on-line is causing difficulties for Parish Councillors and District alike. Some Parish Councils have reduced their discussions to immediate items only and others have tried to run full meetings but found themselves inquorate. We wrote to Lucy Frazer MP, but she did not support reintroducing on-line meetings and said that even if it were to be proposed parliamentary time would be needed to approve it. We can't help feeling that if they spent more time on parliamentary business and less on Bring Your Own Bottle 'work gatherings', they might find time to bring local politics into the 21<sup>st</sup> Century.

Charlotte had the bizarre experience of an Audit Committee meeting where neither the external nor internal auditors were present due to Covid, so they could not be questioned about the £4m errors they found in the 2020/21 accounts or the £4m errors they found in the 2019/20 accounts which had to be corrected through a prior year adjustment. Although these errors cancelled each other out so that the results didn't change, they were material and it's unfortunate that we have to wait until our next meeting in July to question the auditors in Committee.

You no doubt, like many others took your Christmas decorations down well before twelfth night. However, the Church continues to celebrate this midwinter festive season until the 2<sup>nd</sup> February when we finally say goodbye to Christmastide as we arrive at the day called Candlemas.

How did the 2<sup>nd</sup> February come to be called Candlemas? Well, it was the day of the year when all the candles, that were used in the church during the coming year, were brought into church and a blessing was said over them - so it was the Festival Day (or 'Mass') of the Candles. Candles were especially important before the arrival of gas and eventually electric lights were installed in our Churches. Today lit candles in our Church reminds us of God's presence with us.

In our modern world of electric lights inside and street lighting outside we take the idea of the need to make 'a source' to lighten our way in the dark as hardly anything that needs God's blessing. In fact lighting the dark has become so effective nowadays that we seem to need God's blessing to regulate the light pollution which is so common in our towns and cities.

If we don't keep the street lighting under control our children aren't ever going to know or enjoy the wonders of the night-sky. It seems to be that in life it's as much of a problem to have too much of something as to have too little. For example, food, light and warmth to name but a few. I think I also need to add 'personal possessions' to that list.

Andrew and I have moved house on quite a few occasions during our married life and every time we come to pack up we come to the stark realisation that we cannot believe the amount of junk we've accumulated. We have therefore become quite good at multiple journeys down to the local charity shops as well as the municipal dump.

I started this article for the February newsletter by mentioning the religious festival of Candlemas and then dipped into the thought of needing moderation in all things.

I would like to conclude by saying that although winter has yet to release its tight grip on us, we are beginning to see the tips of bulbs poking out of the ground and the daylight hours are noticeably extending.

In our homes and private lives February has often been seen as a decluttering time of the year as we look forward to Spring. In the same way that a feeling of preparation returns as we look forward to being able to enjoy the gardens once more. In thinking about our gardens I'm going to finish by reminding you of a quote from a very famous Victorian landscape gardener called Gertrude Jekyll:-
