BURROUGH GREEN CRICKET



The season finally started a couple of weeks late, and it was only a monumental effort from the grounds team to manage to get a pitch ready for the visit of

Abington on the 20th May. As predicted and with a

wicket that was under water 10 days previously the match was a low scoring affair with a usual quick fire 43 from Aslan Khan the real difference, with wickets being shared around.

This was a stark difference from a week

later on a very flat Little Shelford pitch we managed to rake up 364 in our 40 overs. That was in no small part from our own Doctor in the House Ed Riddell who top scored with a classy 159, and noteworthy knocks from Pete Bragg and Mark Ward, and again the wickets were shared round in a run chase that even the opposition said they weren't going for at the break.

We also have some new additions in the club with babies Frankie Ashcroft and Harry Underwood being born to proud players in the last few weeks. Dear Residents,

I know how valuable local assets are to every community. It is therefore important that we do all we can to protect them.

The Community Ownership Fund does this by enabling communities to take ownership of assets at risk of closure, sale or dereliction so they can be enjoyed once again by local people.

Both parish councils and incorporated voluntary or community organisations are invited to apply for the latest round of funding, which is open from 31 May - 12 July 2023.

Up to £1 million is available for all asset types (which is an increase on the previous limit of £250,000) and funds can cover up to 80 per cent of the total capital funds required, with applicants required to raise the other 20 per cent from other sources.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORTS

East Cambs - Bottisham Ward

At the Council's Annual meeting Cllr Mark Goldsack was elected as the Council's Chair. John is on the Finance & Assets, Planning, and Licensing Committees and the Licensing Sub-Committee (non-statutory). Charlotte is on the Licensing and Audit Committees and the Licensing Sub-Committee (statutory). John is the Lib Dem's lead member on Licensing and Charlotte is the lead member on Audit.

All the Chairs and Vice-Chairs are Conservatives, which is not surprising as they have 15 Councillors to the Lib Dems 13. What is surprising, is how little they have shared these roles around their Group. Cllr Julia Huffer Chairs the Operational Services and Licensing Committees; Cllr Alan Sharp is Chair of Finance & Assets and Vice-Chair of the Operational Services Committee; while Cllr David Brown will be particularly busy as Vice-Chair of Council, Vice-Chair of Planning and Chair of Audit.

The Greater Cambridge Partnership (GCP) has published the responses to its consultation on better public transport and congestion charging. Whilst more than 70% of people were in favour of the future transport network 58% of people were opposed to paying for it through the Congestion Charge. The full

report can be seen at MC22-consultation-report (greatercambridge.org.uk). Just 1,061 of the respondents were from East Cambridgeshire. Franchising of bus services would help by bringing routes, timetables and fares under public control—but would need a reliable source of income to fund it. The Greater Cambridge Partnership must think again and find an acceptable way to fund the public transport improvements local people want and need.

We have been working with the GCP and Parish Councils to ensure that local needs are fully considered in the planned Greenways - cycle ways into Cambridge. They were consulted on before the Covid lockdowns and there has been little local engagement since, although they are due to be installed by 2024. Most residents will welcome improved cycle routes, but they need to be the right routes and their design needs to reflect the character and current use of our villages.

Our July meet your Councillors will be on Wednesday 19 July from 6.30-7.30 at the Committee Room of the Bottisham Sports & Social Club. We will not be holding a meeting in August, due to summer holidays.

County Council Report

Congestion Charging Consultation

The results of the consultation were announced by the Greater Cambridge Partnership (GCP) on 26th May. There were 58% opposed to the charging, with over 70% in favour of more buses, However, as I have previously said, the consultation was full of openended questions, designed to give the result that the GCP wanted rather than a true request for views from residents.

I will update everyone with the next stages of these proposals, as they are presented through the coming months.

East Cambs District Council Report

After the successful election, work has moved on to delivering the manifesto on which we got elected.

After finishing my term of office of two years, I have taken over as Chairman of Finance & Assets Committee and Vice-chairman of the Operational Services Committee. These are the two policy committees, which deliver the services to residents, and I look forward to updating you over the coming months.

In addition, I have relinquished my position as Vice-Chairman of the Combined Authority (CPCA) Overview & Scrutiny Committee and taken up a role as a member

of the CPCA Transport & Infrastructure Committee, which is a decision-making body.

I have already had meetings with officers about the bus improvement plan and how that affects East Cambridgeshire. I will keep you updated.

I am here to represent you, so if there are any issues that concern you, please contact me. If I am not aware of an issue, I am not able to solve it.

It's just about time for summer holidays!

I remember as a small boy eager anticipation for six weeks off school. We habitually went to Scotland for two weeks and generally the rest of the time had fun outside. Those of us of certain age will remember Cliff Richard singing "summer holiday" (though of course that was more for an adult market - no more working for a week or two). Yet if I talk to my American colleagues about summer holidays they are puzzled. The American use of the word holiday tends to be a celebration of a specific day. For example, shortly after this newsletter comes through your letterbox they will be celebrating the "Independence Day Holiday" - on the 4th July. They don't have a "Summer Holiday" - they will take a vacation in summer.

I quite often get a little annoyed about how words change their meanings (and of course spellings) either

side of the Atlantic. Maybe that's "grumpy old man" coming out a bit, although I still have a gentle laugh to myself having once been told by a gentleman in a bar somewhere in semi-urban Texas that I spoke "darned good English for a foreign feller". One can despair about the understanding of the world outside, but if you travel in the US and see the news that is broadcast there you sometimes understand why that might be. Mind you, whether we call it vacation or holiday, I would far rather have the 20+ days paid holiday that most of us in work get on this side of the Atlantic compared with the two weeks vacation there.

However, this time I should put "grumpy old man" away. The origins of the word holiday are far closer to the modern American meaning than the British use. It was a "holy day" - and originally just applied to religious festivals. In Christian Churches we might think of Christmas, Easter, Pentecost, Ascension Day. Many of these became public holidays as well as some of the more secular ones. They were days of renewal, and days of observance.

If you are taking a vacation or a holiday over summer, I hope that a time of renewal and refreshment helps you. Even if you aren't many of our church buildings are open in the daytime. I find just entering them brings me some renewal (and in the hot temperatures that we have been enjoying - or enduring - a cool break).
