CAMBRIDGE FIRE & RESCUE SERVICE BULLETIN Take Charge and Be Safe!

Cambridgeshire Fire and Rescue Service is urging residents to Take Charge and Be Safe by keeping in mind some simple steps when using electrical devices, especially those with Lithium-Ion batteries. By following a few simple safety measures, like adding fire safety to your bedtime routine and being awake when using and charging some devices or appliances, people can keep themselves and their families safe in their homes.

Over the coming weeks more information, including key advice for residents to Take Charge and Be Safe will be released on the fire service's social media channels. Make sure CFRS is in your feed by liking and following us.

Lithium-Ion batteries can be found in many electronic devices that are used every day. Things like mobile phones, laptops and tablets, vape cigarettes and games console controllers, as well as e-scooters and e-bikes.

E-scooters and e-bikes

E-bikes and e-scooters are becoming a popular mode of transport and when bought from a reputable seller, with the correct battery and charger, and maintained well, they can be used safely.

Simple tips can help reduce the risk of overheating a battery:

- Use the correct charger for your battery, and make sure to buy from a reputable seller
- Make sure your battery and charger meet UK safety standards look for the CE mark
- Ideally, don't charge your e-bike or e-scooter overnight or while you are sleeping. If you must charge overnight, charge the bike/scooter in a room away from escape routes, close the door to the room and ensure the room has a smoke detector in it
- Keep an eye out for warning signs that your battery might be failing and becoming a fire risk if the battery is getting very hot, making a noise, smoking, leaking or bulging or the charger cable is frayed, stop using it and get a replacement. It is normal for batteries to feel warm when charging but if it is extremely hot to touch it is a sign it may be defective and could start a fire.
- Let your battery cool after use before charging it
- \cdot Unplug your charger once the battery has charged.

Bedtime routine

Many fires in the home start at night while people are asleep. This can be down to a number of different causes but can be easily avoided by following a few

simple tips, as well as having working smoke alarms on each floor of your home.

A bedtime routine is a great way to help you and your family stay fire safe in your home. By following a few simple tips before heading to bed for the night, you can prevent a fire from happening or, if one does break out, stop it from spreading.

Tip 1 - Switch off plugs and electrical appliances before heading to bed, as well as blowing out candles. Things like fridges, freezers and smart devices (e.g. Alexa) are designed to be kept on, but TVs, microwaves, washing machines and tumble dryers should all be turned off, as should wax melters.

Tip 2 - Closing internal doors will help prevent a fire from spreading, if one does break out. Take the time to close any doors around your home, especially the kitchen door.

Tip 3 - Work out the quickest way to escape your home should a fire break out and make sure it's clear before heading to bed. Keep stairs, hallways and corridors clear of clutter to ensure you and your family can get out quickly if needed.

Tip 4 - Before going to bed, make sure you have quick access to your keys so you can easily leave the house if needed.

Batteries

When buying lithium-ion batteries, there are a couple of things you can look for to decrease the chances of buying a dodgy battery.

The battery should have a CE mark to signify it meets UK standard.

There are a few steps you can follow to increase your safety in your home when charging lithium-ion batteries. Where possible, buy from recognised manufacturers for example.

Lithium-ion batteries can't be disposed of in your regular household recycling. Doing so can cause fires. Many local shops have a battery bank where you can dispose of them, and recycling centres can also take them.

If you're unsure you can check with your local council.

Residents can also use our online home safety check to carry out their own fire risk assessment of their home. This simple to use tool goes through each area of a property and generates a safety plan for the occupants to follow. The check can be carried out on behalf of a vulnerable family member.

DISTRICT COUNCILLORS' REPORT

August was a quiet month on the District Council, but the regular meeting cycle has started up again.

We continue to receive complaints about how Sanctuary Housing are managing their properties serious problems with damp and mould, long delays in completing repairs, properties remaining empty for months or even years, anti-social behaviour by and towards tenants. We take these up individually but have also asked for a meeting with the local manager to discuss the issues more generally.

Charlotte was joined by Jonathan Cook from the AtoB1102 group when she met the Mayor and his transport team in mid-August to discuss the number 11 bus route, and other local bus issues. It was a very positive meeting, and discussions are continuing. The Combined Authority is reviewing the subsidised bus network to ensure that it is getting value for money from the £7.5m which it spends on buses each year. The review has recommended that the 11 between Newmarket, Burwell and Cambridge and the 904 between Newmarket, Dullingham and Brinkley be continued with no further review, along with many other services. They will also be looking to trial a demand responsive bus service Cambridgeshire.

CAMBRIDGESHIRE COUNTY COUNCIL REPORT

Congestion Charge

Some residents will have seen the release of revised plans by the Greater Cambridge Partnership (GCP), where the proposals for a Congestion Charge have been watered down to just peak hours, introducing 50 free days for residents, exemptions for those on low medical exemptions for Addenbrookes and exemptions for charity workers.

At the same time, there have been comments from various Liberal Democrat groups and Cambridge City Labour councillors that they do not support the scheme in its current form.

The Liberal Democrat parliamentary candidates have stated that they are not in favour of the proposals, whilst previously being totally in support of them.

All these statements come after Liberal Democrat and Labour councillors, who control the GCP, have pushed the line that their proposals were the ones that residents and business wanted. They have only stopped, because they have realised that there are many residents who were opposed to the charge and stated their case in the consultation or voted for candidates in the May elections and the Kings Hedges by-election, who were not in favour of the proposals.

Beware of people giving false gifts, as they are only saying that they want a pause until after the General Election due next year and the County Council election due in 2025. So, they are only thinking of votes and not the interests of residents.

The Liberal Democrat and Labour councillors, who are in control of the GCP, have voted for these proposals and spent large sums of taxpayers' money on trying to push the Congestion Charge and other highly controversial road policies through against the wishes of residents.

The ruling County Council administration are bringing a proposal, which they haven't yet divulged, to a special meeting of Highways & Transport Committee on 11th October and the recommendation from that meeting will go to full County Council on 17th October. I await the proposal from the ruling Joint Administration and will update you next month with those proposals.

Mill Road Bridge Restrictions

The Highways & Transport Committee voted in March 2023 to restrict vehicle movement over the Mill Road bridge to buses, taxis and blue badge holders. This is currently subject to a legal challenge and work has been paused until the judicial review has been resolved.

Weeds

The ruling administration at the County Council decided early this year, without reference to a committee, to stop weedkilling across the County. This has had the effect that weeds are getting worse in gutters and pavements. Our group has put a motion to Full Council on 17th October that this decision should be reversed. I will update you next month.

Black Bags

Black Bags for general waste are being delivered, as I write this, and if you haven't received them by the time that you read this, they will be with you very soon.

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I was talking a little while ago to a city-dweller who was telling me how lucky they were because there were so many things that they could do on their doorstep. I have to say that I understand that point of view and I really enjoy spending a few days in a city. Having wonderful theatre and live music within a few minutes' walk (or a regular public transport trip) is very attractive; being able to walk from the shops with your frozen food remaining frozen is also a huge benefit. And yet, they told me that for many people it could be a very lonely existence too. They might walk to the shops but they wouldn't talk with anyone that they passed, and no-one would talk to them either. I know what they meant. Try to strike up a conversation in the street, or on the London Underground, and you might be treated as the outcast yourself.

My parents would talk about a time when no-one in the countryside would ever lock their doors - there was no need to do that. I don't think that I'm quite as trusting as that - but also maybe modern front doors don't work that way quite so easily either. But I'm happy living in our village that I can walk to the Church, or to the Ellesmere Centre and see people that I know, that I can talk to, and that know me. Yet sometimes if someone I don't know tries to open a conversation with me I can feel uncomfortable; and although I'm very happy to say "Good morning" to someone that I pass in the street, I might feel a bit awkward if they try to strike more of a conversation.

Yet I can miss so much if I do that. I can miss so much in our small village; but in the global village I can miss so much more. The well-known Christian parable of the Good Samaritan talks of people who passed on the other side of the street, and its simple story is so well understood that the term "Samaritan" has come to mean someone who is friendly and helpful to others; yet at the time of telling that parable they would have meant anything but. The wider context though, was in terms of who was a "neighbour". Sometimes in that context, people who live so close to many others have no neighbours and live that lonely existence. I hope that I can be more of a neighbour; maybe even one day on the Underground too.
