Dear Ellesmere patrons and supporters,

Covid-19 pandemic has generated an unprecedented impact on all of us and the Ellesmere Centre is not immune. Following the lockdown period during which the main Centre remained closed, management took action to minimise costs and accepted the support available from the furlough scheme to support our staff as well as grant funding available. These support mechanisms proved crucial in stabilising the Centre's finances. The ongoing restrictions on use of the centre following its reopening have resulted in revenues for the Centre being severely depleted, and, whilst the costs of operating the centre are subject to constant review to minimise. in some areas they have increased (for instance increased cleaning costs). Overall they are largely unaffected with the result that the Centre's financial resources are being depleted.

At present there appears no prospect for further support of the sort provided in the early weeks of the pandemic. The Centre needs to consider how to address an impending funding issue before matters become critical in order that the Centre can remain open for the remainder of current crisis and resume its place at the heart of our community when normality returns. To this end, the support of local people is sought to provide donations to the Ellesmere Centre, perhaps by setting up a standing order for regular donations or by way of one-off donations (Gift aided

if possible). If you feel you can help, please contact the office.

Your support for the Ellesmere Centre is, as always, hugely appreciated and any

assistance you can provide will make a difference.

WHAT'S ON AT THE RED LION BRINKLEY

We are sorry to advise that, like many others now placed in the new Tier 2 with its much tougher restrictions on pubs and restaurants, we have decided to remain closed during all of December.



We will continue to offer takeaway food seven days a



week for the entire month. Reviewing Tiers on Wednesday December 16th is utterly useless for the many pubs that receive



their beer deliveries on a Monday or Tuesday.

This has been a horrible decision for us to come to, especially at this time of year, but it is winter now and that is just another unwelcome variable in the equation for us. We are deeply sorry to be writing this and we hope you all understand.

Huge numbers of pubs and restaurants up north were reporting a 75 - 80% drop in income last month when subjected to the ridiculous restrictions we are now moving into. Christmas and New Year fall on weekends this year and we can't even have a two-household family in the pub.

We hope and think East Cambs has a high chance of being in Tier 1 from early January in which case we will open again on Thursday 7^{th} (beer deliveries!) Since March we have been so glad to try and do what we thought might be good for others. It has also been an emotionally draining time for ourselves, and so for December, we are doing what we think may be the least bad thing for our business and for ourselves all things considered.



We are still prepared to provide full-on Christmas meals on Christmas day as a



hope that after all the extended restrictions of November and December, it allows many of you to get together with your extended family over Christmas for a few days since it has been a very long nine months for all of you too.

We wish you all a particularly wonderful holiday time, especially this year.

This rare moth (unfortunately deceased) was found in Brinkley by a dog walker in October. It has blue underwings, and when folded is very well camouflaged on tree trunks. The Clifden Nonpareil - whose name means "beyond compare" - is one of the largest and most spectacular moths native to the UK.

It has a wingspan that can reach almost 12cm and a bright blue stripe across its black hindwings, which gives rise to an alternative name of the blue underwing.

These moths have always been rare in the UK.

It's amazing what's about if we all keep our eyes open!

LUCY FRAZER END OF YEAR UPDATE

As we look to the end of 2020, I wanted to take this opportunity to update you on some of the work I have been doing over the course of this year.

2020 has been a challenging year for all of us and I want to pay tribute to everyone who has helped and supported their local communities and vulnerable individuals during the pandemic. The response to the public health challenge of Coronavirus saw us pulling together, ensuring that our communities across Cambridgeshire kept connected. And I know that our villages are continuing their great support to others. I was pleased to safely meet with local volunteers in person across the constituency during the summer months – and to take part in regular Zoom updates with local leaders and stakeholders.

The Coronavirus pandemic brought an economic shock to the UK like we have not experienced before, but I am encouraged to see that we are taking steps towards a positive recovery. By the summer, in our area 14,700 furloughed workers were supported through the Job Retention Scheme and 4,600 self-employed individuals were given help through the Self-Employment Income Scheme. 1,687 local businesses received a cash grant of up to £25,000 thanks to the local authority discretionary grant fund. Whilst these measures have brought relief to both employers and employees, local shopping has also brought with it further support over the last few months.

Whilst the government is focused on dealing with the pandemic, other projects are still progressing, and I continue to work to improve our area. I welcome the announcement that the Department of Health has awarded Cambridge University hospitals £1.9 million to expedite the complete redevelopment of Addenbrooke's hospital, this will include a new children's hospital. And at the beginning of October, the Prime Minister also announced the building of a new cancer hospital. Residents across Cambridgeshire rely upon Addenbrooke's Hospital for their medical care, and population growth makes its complete replacement with a brand-new hospital in the years ahead a necessity.

I have campaigned hard for continued investment in NHS services in our local area, and the construction of a new hospital has my complete support. This development is further evidence of the government's commitment to this scheme, and the NHS more generally. I will continue to do everything in my power to make sure that Cambridgeshire sustains its reputation for world-class medical services.

Furthermore for some I have been pressing for improvements to the A10 and spearheaded the campaign for its dualling. Some progress has been made on this project. There are eight options for the project, and the Mayor and Combined Authority held

a virtual consultation during the summer to collect feedback from residents and road users. I have continued to press the Treasury on the importance of this work.

The Greenways scheme is one of the local efforts to improve cycleways by constructing routes between central Cambridge and nearby villages. The routes will help to reduce pressure on public transport and offer more environmentally friendly ways to commute and get around. I have supported this scheme since 2017, working with the Greater Cambridge Partnership and other local stakeholders to ensure that local residents were involved in determining the routes. This currently includes 6 routes in our area. I am really pleased that the routes to Fulbourn, Waterbeach and Linton have been approved. Having recently met with the GCP and written to the Board to press for further routes I am delighted that the three further routes in Horningsea, Bottisham and Swaffhams have also been approved. I'm looking forward to using the routes and hope you will do the same!

Education has also been a key campaign pledge since I was first elected. Year after year I have taken heads to Westminster to meet the Education Secretary. As a result of much campaigning with teachers and others the 2021-2022 academic year will see per pupil funding increase by an average of 4%. The National Funding Formula allocations reflect a 60% increase in the total additional funding for small and remote schools and this is good news for small schools in our area who can attract further funding due to their status. I remain proud that East Cambridgeshire is one of 12 Opportunity Areas that enables the region to unlock additional funding.



We're here to help you stay well this winter

This winter, it's really important that we all remember that the NHS is here to help you stay well, safely.

We have been working hard to make changes to how healthcare is provided to make it safe for you during the ongoing coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic.

If you're worried about your health, don't delay. The sooner you get advice, the better.

Depending on your symptoms, you can get advice from your local pharmacy, GP practice or NHS 111. For minor health concerns, your local pharmacist can help. GP practices offer remote consultations online or by phone, or if you need a face-to-face appointment, they will tell you what to do.

If you need medical help fast, think you need to go to an Emergency Department (A&E) or you're not sure what to do, use NHS 111 first - online or by phone to get clinical advice or direction to the most appropriate services for treatment for you.

You can also help us to help you. If you are over 65, have a long-term health condition or are pregnant, it is more important than ever this year to ensure you have your free flu vaccination. Just speak to your GP or pharmacist to book an appointment. You can also find more information at www.nhs.uk/fluvaccine

Be sure to also stock up your medicine cabinet with winter self-care essentials too. Many over-the-counter medicines (including paracetamol and ibuprofen) are available to help relieve symptoms of common winter illnesses and you can find further information at www.nhs.uk

With the announcement of the latest lockdown our training has remained virtual through October and November. Cadets continue to achieve and push forwards with the training syllabus with the support of virtual parade nights.

DISTRICT COUNCILLORS REPORTS

East Cambs

Charlotte Cane & John Trapp

Licensing Committee considered minor changes to licensing taxis and Covid-19 restrictions. Generally businesses were complying, but some found the rules difficult to understand and our officers are providing advice. Government has given extra funding to help with this.

At the last meeting of the District Council:

- Several questions from the public around Climate Change: divesting from fossil fuels, EV Charging points, energy efficiency of homes
- Petition calling for Mepal Outdoor Centre to remain as an outdoor activities facility.
- Agreed a motion to seek rural area designation for affordable housing, and thus lower the threshold at which affordable housing starts
- Agreed a motion to ask officers to discuss options for parking enforcement in the District with the Chief Constable.
- Adopted our Statement of Licensing Policy (which we do every 5 years.
- Agreed our response to the Planning White Paper
 one of concern that the policies in the Paper would reduce local participation.

Councillors were given a briefing on the outcome of the bus questionnaire, and the bus route that meanders from Burwell to Cambridge was deemed to be the most useful of all the others in the District. There were many responses supporting a more extensive timetable, as well as a Sunday service. Concern was also expressed about the time it took to reach Cambridge in the rush-hours.

DO YOU TRAVEL INTO CAMBRIDGE?

Improvements to travel into Cambridge from the East are being explored by the Greater Cambridge Partnership (Cambridge City Council and South Cambridgeshire District Council working together) and they have started a public consultation that is not limited to their residents, and includes all who travel, by whatever means, into Cambridge. As Cambridge employment expands there will be more people travelling into Cambridge, and this is a vision for the future.

They are considering short-term and long-term improvements. From moving the Park 'n' Ride site, or an underpass under Cambridge airport, to opening up Cambridge East, a rail station at Fulbourn or Six Mile Bottom. Although five options have been put forward in the brochure, there is no reason why you don't make your own observations and suggestions. For example, would a Park 'n' Ride site to the east of the Quy roundabout be appealing? Even though you may only use a car to travel into Cambridge, it will still be useful to let them know why you do so, and what may tempt you to change your mode of travel.

Current working arrangements during COVID-19

During the current lockdown, the Council offices have been closed to visitors. Please use online facilities or call 01353 665555 to speak to the Customer Services team. Some of the Council team will be working on COVID specific duties rather their normal duties, so please bear with us if the response is longer than normal. Please contact us if you are having difficulty getting the response that you require.

Bus Working Group

The results of the Bus Working Group after the resident's consultation earlier in the year will be presented to The Cambridgeshire & Peterborough Combined Authority and discussions will be had with them. The Working Group will pick up the consultation results of the walking and cycling consultation.

Dedicated car parking enforcement

The Council is exploring implementation of CSAS (Community Safety Accreditation Scheme) as a dedicated car parking enforcement resource for the District. The Council proposes to have discussions with the Chief Constable to discuss this issue and reported to the Finance and Assets Committee detailing any legal and financial implications.

Planning White Paper

The Government has published a White Paper, which is a document to enable discussion around a proposed Act of Parliament, on changing the Planning process. East Cambridgeshire District Council, whilst supporting some of the changes have concerns over several of the draft proposals, either because there is little detail of the proposed changes or they require further working.

ECDC, as a consultee, has sent a detailed response to Government over the details of the proposals that we have concern. This issue will be updated, once more information is available.

Dog Fouling on the Green, Burrough Green.

It was raised at the recent Parish Council meeting that dog fouling on the green and near the play area, has started to become a reoccurring problem again. I am sure that all residents that own dogs will assist us by ensuring they collect their dog's waste and dispose of it in the Dog Waste Bin provided.

Under the Anti-Social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014 in England and Wales, a person who doesn't clean up after their dog may face an on-the-spot fine of up to £80. These fines are known as fixed penalty notices. If a person refuses to pay, they can be taken to the local Magistrates Court for the dog fouling offence and fined up to £1,000. The Parish Council hope that this notice will encourage all dog owners to act responsibly, and to improve the problem without the need to introduce fines for offenders, and we thank you for your cooperation.
