MARSH MAIL - News from Linton Village College

At Linton Village College we have been working hard to keep school as safe as possible since reopening to all students in September. While it has been necessary to make curriculum adjustments to prioritise the health and wellbeing of the community, it has been really important to us that students benefit from a great quality of education.

An important part of students' curriculum experience is opportunities for enrichment. We have had to pause extra-curricular activities to focus on safe, core provision and ensure year group separation. We are looking forward to being able to relaunch a range of clubs and extend our curriculum offer when it is safe to do so.

Despite the restrictions, LVC staff and students are finding ways to bring learning to life in lots of imaginative ways. An example of this is in the Arts. GCSE Dance students are benefiting from virtual links via Teams with A Level students at Abbey Gate Sixth Form College in Bury St. Edmunds and GCSE Music students enjoyed being able to safely perform in a mini open air Christmas concert at the end of term. The Arts team is also busy preparing students for practical exams and a Year 7 production of Charlie and the Chocolate Factory is underway.

School staff have had to be incredibly innovative to adapt to the challenges of educating our young people in the current context. The prospect of returning to 'normal' later this year is a welcome relief to staff, students and parents. Learning during lockdown has taught us the value of human relationships and connections and the importance of the holistic, enriching aspects of education for students' physical and mental health.

However, the phrase 'necessity is the mother of invention' has certainly struck a chord in schools over the last 9 months. There are plenty of innovations and developments that have arisen through necessity that we will harness in the future. Developing our use of technology has enabled flipped learning, virtual parents' evenings and click and collect library loans.

Seeing students living the Linton Learner attributes through their responsible, caring and independent conduct and staff rallying together with community spirit will certainly sustain us this term.

CAMBRIDGE FIRE AND RESCUE BULLETIN

Distraction is one of the biggest causes of fires in the home - most of which start in the kitchen.

You lock your door when you leave the house, but do you unplug your chargers?

You turn off your oven when you aren't using it but do you regularly ensure there isn't a fat build up in your oven, hob and grill?

A simple fire safety check list can help you avoid an unnecessary fire in your home - Simple tips, simply STOP the chance of a fire.

• NEVER overload sockets: Multi-socket adapters, often used in homes to provide more plug sockets quickly and easily, are particularly popular during the winter period when people are more likely to plug in heating devices, lights and other items. If used incorrectly however, these can be very dangerous and cause an electrical fire through overloading the socket. 'One appliance, one socket' is the safest approach to avoid any danger of fire in your home.

• Switch off, Turn off: If it isn't meant to be left on (like fridges, freezers) switch it off and turn it off at the plug when it isn't in use.

• Charge safely: Only use electrical charging devices for the purpose they were intended and avoid purchasing counterfeit, cheap charging devices for electrical items and always keep leads away from cookers and hobs.

• Fat-Free, Fire-Free: Fat can build up slowly over time through regular use of kitchen devices and as it does it increases the chance of a fire when cooking. Ensure you regularly maintain hobs, grills and ovens and keep them clear from fat build up and safer from fire.

• Distraction causes fires: over 50% of fires in the kitchen are caused by distraction - pay attention and avoid cooking if under the influence of alcohol or medication or feeling tired.

DISTRICT AND COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S

REPORTS

Henry Batchelor & Geoff Harvey (South Cambs) A1307 Update

The upgrades, managed by the Greater Cambridge Partnership (GCP), to the A1307 continue with the next steps being installation of average speed cameras between Haverhill and Linton, a new roundabout at the end of Bartlow Road in Linton and remodelling of the Dean Road junction. The signalised pedestrian crossing at Hildersham is attempting to move ahead but are having difficulty securing the land required. The GCP are trying all avenues, including compulsory purchase, which will increase the project time as this isn't a quick process.

(Another) GCP Consultation

The GCP have finished consulting on their preferred new off-road route between the new travel hub/park & ride site and Cambridge. This is a huge piece of infrastructure, so please do engage. The consultation closed December 14^{th} . The consultation documents can be seen online at -

The joint Local Plan, being drawn up between South Cambs and the City councils, is still moving forward. The latest update is that the findings from the consultation last year have now been collated and published. The councils will take this information on board whilst formulating their preferred options, which will likely be published next autumn. Uttlesford Local Plan

Some of you may remember that last year Uttlesford District Council (directly to the south of us, North Essex) submitted plans to a government inspector to allocate 10,000 houses near Gt Chesterford as part of their Local Plan. The inspector told them to go away and start again, which they are now doing and are asking for public engagement in this process. Uttlesford still need to allocate these houses somewhere and there is still a risk of them trying to do so on/near to the South Cambridgeshire border, which will directly affect our infrastructure etc etc. Geoff and Henry will keep you as up to date as possible from the local authority angle but do keep your ears to the ground!

Zero Carbon Communities Grant

The judging and selection process for this year's entries has started. The standard of creativity and imagination shown in 2020 was impressive. The cost if all applications were funded would be about twice the allocated funding, so unfortunately not all schemes will have been successful. I was noteworthy that at least one scheme not successful last year scored highly this year, with a much-improved scheme and application write-up. So the message should be to keep trying if, as we would hope, funding is available to run the scheme again next year.

One thing that we forgot to include in the report is that South Cambs now have an online customer-facing business directory to help signpost people to local businesses. It's free to sign-up and only takes a few minutes. Here's the link - <u>www.scambs.gov.uk/localbusiness-directory</u>

Charlotte Cane and John Trapp (East Cambs)

At the last meeting of the Operational Services Committee:

-It was decided to support the Local Electricity Bill and to write to local MPs to ask them to support the bill.

-The grant to the Voluntary and Community Action East Cambs was renewed. -The reports on Waste Collection and Street Cleansing showed very good performance.

At the last meeting of the Finance & Assets Committee:

-The External Audit noted some areas that required improvement, but nothing major, and the report was accepted.

-The ECDC accounts for the last year were submitted and approved. There was some disquiet voiced about the further loan to East Cambs Trading Company, the Council's company for building development.

-The Council Tax Reduction Scheme was continued.

-A new trustee was appointed to East Cambs CLT which has only four members; some misgivings were voiced over the appointment of the Leader of the Council to a supposedly-community led organisation. Clarification of the purpose of this trust, its governance and its relation to Palace Green Homes and East Cambs Community Housing was sought.

-The Bus Services Review document was accepted and will be submitted to the Cambs and Peterborough Combined Authority. Besides the continuation, and augmentation, of the no. 11 bus to Cambridge, other interesting ideas such as a fast bus from Bottisham to Cambridge North, and Demand Responsive Transport to the south of the A14 were proposed.

-The Gender Pay report for ECDC showed that there was still a gap in pay between genders.

All Council meetings are now on Zoom, and available to view retrospectively as well as being screened live, so you can see your Councillors in action. For details go to the Council website, <u>www.eastcambs.gov.uk</u>.

The Surgery will be followed by 'Meet your Councillors' on the same Zoom link, and this will be a group meeting to listen to, and discuss, your ideas and opinions with others.

As we write this, the Covid vaccine is starting to be rolled out, which gives huge hope to all of us. But it is critical that we continue to follow social distancing, mask wearing and hand washing as well as other restrictions.

If we keep protecting ourselves and each other, 2021 should be a healthy year for all of us. Happy New Year
