

He took up bridge, green bowls and indoor bowls. After retiring in 1990, he designed and did the carpentry and groundwork on the bungalow in which he lived for 27 years.

He will be sadly missed by us all but at the grand age of 96 he lived and long and fulfilled life.

We can look at all sorts of projects, but they need to have some educational purpose. We have helped a range of overseas travel projects, provided money to help buy special equipment for A-level studies and helped with the costs of attending courses and events with the Guides. If you are applying to an apprenticeship scheme, or to a university, the award could help towards the purchase of books, IT, material, equipment and so on. #### Dog Fouling on the Green, Burrough Green.

It was raised at the recent Parish Council meeting that dog fouling on the green and near the play area, has started to become a recurring problem again. I am sure that all residents who own dogs will assist us by ensuring they collect their dog's waste and dispose of it in the Dog Waste Bin provided.

Under the Anti-Social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014 in England and Wales, a person who doesn't clean up after their dog may face an on-the-spot fine of up to £80. These fines are known as fixed penalty notices. If a person refuses to pay, they can be taken to the local Magistrates Court for the dog fouling offence and fined up to £1,000. The Parish Council hope that this notice will encourage all dog owners to act responsibly, and to improve the problem without the need to introduce fines for offenders, and we thank you for your cooperation.

#### DISTRICT COUNCILLORS' REPORT

Charlotte Cane & John Trapp

The District Council adopted the Custom and Self Build and Natural Environment Supplementary Planning Documents (SPD), which developers now must follow. We were impressed by how many individuals and Parish Councils responded with support and ideas to strengthen the measures further, particularly for the Natural Environment SPD. Unfortunately, SPDs can only strengthen and expand on policies already in the Local Plan. This means that many of the suggestions, which Councillors also supported, could not be included as they could not be linked with policies in our current Local Plan. But they have all been recorded and will be brought forward again for consideration when we develop a new Local Plan. As the current plan dates back to 2015, John and Charlotte are keen that we should start work on drafting a new Local Plan which properly addresses the climate emergency and our need for affordable housing. Meanwhile, the Council is now consulting on a Climate Change SPD to ensure our Planning Policies reduce climate impact. We hope that many people will comment on this SPD by the closing date of 23rd November - you can read the draft document on-line or request a copy from the Council.

We are also consulting on our Equality, Diversity and Inclusion Policy, which seeks to ensure that we fully include everyone in service provision, job opportunities and other aspects of the District Council's activities. This is an important document, and we are keen for many people to comment, so that we develop a policy which builds a community in which all can take part and all can take pride. The deadline for comments is the end of November.

Members of the Bus Working Party finally received feedback from the bus services consultation. This will be discussed by all members at a seminar at the end of October before Finance & Assets Committee decide on the Council's request to the Cambridgeshire & Peterborough Combined Authority for improved bus services in East Cambs. John and Charlotte are pressing for the results of the walking and cycling surveys, which have still not been reported to members even though the consultation closed at the end of May. We were pleased to note that many people locally had responded to the bus survey with ideas for improvements to buses to Ely, Newmarket and Cambridge, including considering wider destinations such as Addenbrookes and Cambridge North.

We will be holding our next Councillors' Surgery by Zoom on 17<sup>th</sup> November from 6.00pm. The meeting code is: 631 542 4066 and the passcode is: 938720. If you prefer to follow a link, it will be on Charlotte's Facebook page - <u>fb.me/charlottecanelibdem</u>. The Surgery will be followed by 'Meet your Councillors' from 7.00pm on the same Zoom link. If you join for the surgery, you will be held in the waiting room if there is already someone in the meeting with us, so that any discussions during the surgery remain confidential.

#### 2523 LINTON AIR CADETS.

At Linton we continue to have success with BTEC awards in lock-down with Corporals Fenn, Tysoe, Keenan and Murray all submitting their Level 2 awards in Teamwork and Personal Development. We look forward to receiving the results for these soon.

Virtual parade nights continue to be a success with Cadets often running sessions themselves; recently we have had interesting lectures from Cadet Morris about aero-modelling and Cadet Vellacott on professional flight simulators. We continue to meet weekly for virtual training.

Planning for our return to face to face activity is item 1 on our agenda. Meeting our own internal policy criteria as well as all guidance from the National Youth Agency so we can ensure a safe return to activities is our absolute priority. I'm pleased to say considerable progress is being made and we hope to have

announcements regarding our return to face to face in the coming weeks.

A full training program has been put together for our return. Over virtual parade nights we have covered all sorts of theory including leadership, fieldcraft, first aid and radio training. I look forward to seeing cadets able to complete all the practical aspects of our comprehensive syllabus soon.

Usually at this time of year we would be focussing on drill and uniform so we are on top form for parading the squadron and our banners at both Castle Camps and Linton memorial parades however this year due to the circumstances things will look considerably different. ### MARSH MAIL - News from Linton Village College

In the absence of being able to showcase the College in the usual way at the start of October, we held a virtual Open Evening including a series of films that help to capture life at LVC and feature great contributions from some of our students and families. Materials are available to view on the 6-7 pages on the College website (<a href="www.lvc.org">www.lvc.org</a>) including a recording of a live Q&A webinar with members of the College's Senior Leadership Team.

We have welcomed three teachers to the College's Senior Leadership Team this academic year: George Jenkins, who has joined us from a school in Bethnal Green and is leading on behaviour for learning, Cameron Fehr from another Trust in Cambridgeshire who is our new Head of Maths and assessment and Anna Garner, who returns to teach at LVC as our Director of Inclusion.

Anna Garner, joins us as SENCO as well as having oversight for Alternative Provision and attendance. Anna is leading developments in special educational needs at the College, including establishing Thrive nurture classes and enhancing the quality of our provision.

In the current context, there is even more demand for specialist support for young people to be able to address specific learning and emotional needs.

We are currently advertising for a Higher Level Teaching Assistant to join the Learning Support Team at LVC to contribute to the catch up curriculum and targeted intervention.

We are really keen to make effective use of what was originally the Warden's House and more recently a caretaker's onsite residence. The property needs some adaptation and renovation to make it fit for purpose as an educational building.

With regular fundraising opportunities through the Friends of LVC being restricted for the time being, we

would like to run some crowdfunding through the College's Just Giving website. The funds raised would contribute to the cost of refurbishing the house and creating a welcoming learning space for our most vulnerable students and those in need of more individualised support.

#### CAMBRIDGE FIRE & RESCUE SERVICE

#### Show respect this bonfire night

Cambridgeshire Fire and Rescue Service is joining forces with local authority partners and emergency services to help keep people safe this bonfire and fireworks season.

With many organised events cancelled across the county, emergency services are preparing for a busier night than usual. There is an emerging concern that more people will plan displays and bonfires to celebrate in their own gardens, which could pose significant risk for those who choose to use them.

We are asking everyone to show respect this Bonfire Night.

Head of Community Fire Safety, Group Commander Per Middleton, said: "Bonfire Night is historically a very popular fixture in the calendar where people come together to enjoy firework displays, however this year is very different. With the COVID-19 pandemic still with us, the organised displays we would usually enjoy cannot take place and we are concerned that some people may decide to hold their own displays.

"While most people enjoy fireworks responsibly, they can quickly become a disaster and, in the wrong hands, they can cause injury and damage to property. Fireworks are explosives and should be treated with respect. Only use fireworks in accordance with the manufacturer's instructions and the firework safety code, ensuring all necessary safety precautions are taken.

"We would strongly discourage people from lighting bonfires in back gardens as they present significant risks to residents if they get out of hand. Not only this, but the smoke can also aggravate coronavirus symptoms for those that might be shielding or isolating."

"We would encourage residents across the county to think twice before having their own displays and lighting bonfires in their gardens this year. Not only do these present risks for residents and our crews, but with the pandemic still with us we all have a responsibility to ensure we don't put unnecessary

strain on emergency services. Please show respect this Bonfire Night and think twice about having your own display."

Group Commander Middleton added: "Although bonfire night might look a little different this year, there are still ways families can enjoy it safely. There are lots of family friendly activities people can do at home, such as watching a virtual display, or doing some crafts together to mark the occasion, without putting their loved ones at risk.

"It's also really important that residents remember the government's rule of six to help control the spread of COVID-19."

If you intend to buy fireworks for a home display, please follow the firework safety code:

- · Only buy fireworks marked with a CE mark
- · Don't drink alcohol if you're setting off fireworks
- Keep fireworks in a closed box and always follow the instructions carefully when using them
- · Light them at arms length using a taper and stand well back
- Never go back to them once they are lit. Even if a firework hasn't gone off, it could still explode
- Never throw fireworks, and never put them in your pocket
- Respect your neighbours don't let off fireworks late at night and remember there are laws in place you must follow
- Take care with sparklers never give them to children under five. Even when they've gone out they're still hot, so put sparklers in a bucket of water after use
- Keep your pets indoors throughout the evening.

Fireworks can also cause a great deal of distress to animals. In a recent survey, 62 per cent of dog owners reported their pets showing signs of distress during fireworks season, with 54 per cent of cat owners experiencing the same. Cambridgeshire Fire and Rescue Service and the National Fire Chiefs Council are supporting the RSPCA's Bang Out Of Order campaign, encouraging the responsible use of fireworks and the adoption of tighter regulations concerning their use.

We are now very much into Autumn and the darker nights.

Hopefully, residents have enjoyed the summer, although we appear to have had the extremes of the weather in the last few weeks, with loads of sun, wind and rain!

#### Bus, Walk, Cycle Consultation - Survey

The results of the consultation have been analysed and the Bus Working Group, which Alan leads, met two weeks ago and there is a District Council member's seminar at the end of October followed by another meeting to discuss potential proposals in early November.

Some quick wins on cycling schemes have been achieved around the County, but detailed work on analysing the longer-term schemes will be discussed soon.

#### Climate Change Policy

The issue of climate change is all around us and after East Cambridgeshire District Council passed a Climate Change Emergency in October 2019, the Council's committees have continued working measures that will reduce the carbon footprint in the District. The Finance & Assets Committee at their meeting on 23<sup>rd</sup> July, approved a budget of £100,000 to implement those plans and there is a Supplementary Planning Document on Climate Change out for consultation, which has the aim of helping planning achieve development which has a lower impact on the climate. Please look at the document on the ECDC website and add any comments that you may have to help in refining the document.

#### Sky Lanterns & Balloons

After the motion presented to Full Council on 16<sup>th</sup> July 2020, asking that the release of sky lanterns and balloons be banned on all property and land owned by East Cambs District Council, all Parish Councils within East Cambridgeshire have been contacted and some have already passed a similar motion to ban the release of sky lanterns and balloons from Parish Council land. In addition, a plan on how to communicate this to businesses, landowners, communities, schools and individuals in East Cambridgeshire is ongoing.
